
STUDENTS STRENGTH AND GENDER DISTRIBUTION & SOCIAL BACK GROUND



MALE--FEMALE RATIO


Distribution of students in the year






SOCIAL BACKGROUND: NUMBER OF SC, ST AND OBC STUDENTS

A project entitled "A Study on the Variability of Total Electron Content near the Crest of the Equatorial Anomaly in the Indian zone" has been sanctioned by the INDIAN SPACE RESEARCH ORGANISATION (ISRO), Department of Space, Government of India, under RESPOND Program for financial assistance. Total approved grant for the Project is Rs.6.96 lakhs

for three years. Principal Investigator of the said Project is Dr. Shyamal Kumar Chakraborty, Department of Physics.

The implementation date for the Project is 12th January, 2006. One Junior Research Fellow named Rajkumar Hajra, M.Sc. in Physics, has been recruited under this project. The Project is mainly based on variability study of lonospheric Total Electron Content (TEC) which is one of the important parameters for the Space Weather problem. TEC has been measured by Faraday rotation technique using trans-ionospheric signal (136.11 MHz) from the geostationary satellite ETS II. The data were recorded at the lonospheric Field Station, Haringhata (22.48° N, 88.5° E, dip: 32° N) of the University of Calcutta. Field station, being situated virtually below the northern crest of the Equatorial anomaly, presents an excellent platform for studying Equatorial Phenomena. A long term (1979-90) TEC data base along with solar flux (810.7), electrojet/ magnetic and wind data will be utilized for the present analysis. Unique feature of the data base is that it includes both the increasing phase (1986-90) as well as decreasing phase (1979-85) of solar activity. Extensive study will be made to find out dependence of TEC, both qualitatively and quantitatively, on various geophysical parameters. The study will be useful in predicting the ionospheric group delay of trans-ionospheric signal as used in GPS and other systems.

A project entitled "A Study on the Variability of Total Electron Content near the Crest of the Equatorial Anomaly in the Indian zone" has been sanctioned by the INDIAN SPACE RESEARCH ORGANISATION (ISRO), Department of Space, Government of India, under RESPOND Program for financial assistance. Total approved grant for the Project is Rs.6.96 lakhs for three years. Principal Investigator of the said Project is Dr. Shyamal Kumar Chakraborty, Department of Physics. The implementation date for the Project is 12th January, 2006. One Junior Research Fellow named Rajkumar Haira, M.Sc. in Physics, has been recruited under this project. The Project is mainly based on variability study of lonospheric Total Electron Content (TEC) which is one of the important parameters for the Space Weather problem. TEC has been measured by Faraday rotation technique using trans-ionospheric signal (136.11 MHz) from the geostationary satellite ETS II. The data were recorded at the Ionospheric Field Station, Haringhata (22.48° N, 88.5° E, dip: 32° N) of the University of Calcutta. Field station, being situated virtually below the northern crest of the Equatorial anomaly, presents an excellent platform for studying

Equatorial Phenomena. A long term (1979-90) TEC data base along with solar flux (810.7), electrojet/ magnetic and wind data will be utilized for the present analysis. Unique feature of the data base is that it includes both the increasing phase (1986-90) as well as decreasing phase (1979-85) of solar activity. Extensive study will be made to find out dependence of TEC, both qualitatively and quantitatively, on various geophysical parameters. The study will be useful in predicting the ionospheric group delay of trans-ionospheric signal as used in GPS and other systems.






PERCENTAGE OF TEACHERS HAVING M.PHIL and Ph. D DEGREES



i) NATIONAL SERVICE

SCHEME (NSS)

Governing Body of Raja Peary Mohan College resolved to open a NSS unit in this college on 12.10.2004. Accordingly, one unit of NSS was opened and got the University affiliation and approval from Calcutta University in 2007. An advisory committee has been formed with the Principal, Dr. Milan Kumar Pal as the Chairman and Dr Hrishita Gupta Bakshi as the convener or the Programme Officer. There are 200 student members who form the backbone of the activities undertaken in the nearby slum areas recently.

Activities of 2007-2008:

- > The college NSS unit organized a Camp with the Physically Challenged Children in September 2007. The camp was organized in the Deaf and Dumb School, located in Makhla, Uttarpara, Hooghly. The student members of the unit spent a whole day with them and learnt how to teach them, how to communicate with them and how they communicate with the so-called normal human being. We also got a glimpse of their creativity through their handicrafts items and small one act drama that presented before us.
- > The unit organized a Three Days drama workshop on "Theatre Performance" from 20th to 23rd December 2007 in collaboration with the Performing art cell of the college. About 50 students appeared for the screening tests from different colleges of West Bengal, among which 36 were selected. Famous theatre personality Arun Mukhopadhyay inaugurated Sri

workshop. The Secretary of West Bengal Natya Academy was also present and graced the occasion. After the three day workshop a certificate of participation was awarded to the participants.

- ➤ The unit organized a seminar on the **National Youth Day** in the college on 12th January 2008. Students of our college and also from different local schools participated in the seminar on "**Vivekanada and Aajker Yuva samaj**". Speaker for this occasion was **Dr Somnath Bhattacharyya**
- The unit also undertook the task to make a small garden in the college courtyard. Several plants of flowers and also plants of other varieties are planted. Watering and regular caring of the plants are done by the students' members of the NSS unit of our college.

iv) RAJA PEARY MOHAN COLLEGE MEDICAL UNIT

- From 1957 plays were regularly staged during the annual festival of the College. It is said that the students of the College were taught the techniques of acting by the famous Indian theatre personality Sisir Kumar Bhadhuri (who was once a College teacher in English) who came to the college regularly to direct the students of the College for a presentation of Tagore's Post Office. (*Theatre Prayag*, p-73, Vol. 3, No.1, October, 2004).
- ➤ We would like to specially emphasize the role of the students of this College in taking active participation in cultural activities in the form of theatre, dance-drama, singing competitions etc. The Students' Theatre Group was ranked first in "All Bengal Inter—College Drama Competition" under the leadership of Dr Kuntal Mukhopadhyay, a prominent theatre personality and a faculty member of the college, organized by Sudrak and sponsored by Maharaja Manindra College, Kolkata.
- ➤ The Students' Union actively participates in socio-cultural upliftment through production of dramas which are staged in various villages and townships of the districts of West Bengal.



21. IMPROVEMENTS IN LIBRARY SERVICES

- The College Library is situated in the 3rd Floor of the old building with a beautiful overview of the Hooghly river and Dakshineswar Temple. This Library was established in the year 1927 and has a rare book section of invaluable books.
- Presently, the total number of books in the Library is 21,115 and every year there is a fresh purchase of books from the UGC grants. The Library remains open on all days except on holidays and Sundays. There is a duly constituted Library Committee.
- The manual cataloguing of the books is nearly complete. The library catalogue is being wholly computerized. This monumental work is progressing satisfactorily and is expected to be completed by next year. The library infrastructure has also been revamped with more organised racks, proper seating arrangements and improved toilet/drinking water facilities. Each department is upgrading their seminar library with addition of new books and journals.
- Due to heavy rains in the last year there was a leakage of the roof and several books had been damaged. To avoid further damage, all the books of the Central library had been shifted to a new hall to facilitate the treatment of the roof of the Central library. After proper repair of the roof, the shifting of such books to the renovated Central Library has been made.







CONSTITUTION OF THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION RAJA PEARY MOHAN COLLEGE, UTTARPARA, HOOGHLY CONSTITUTION OF THE

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF RAJA PEARY MOHAN COLLEGE

1. NAME

 The name of the Association shall be ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF RAJA PEARY MOHAN COLLEGE, UTTARPARA, HOOGHLY

2. OFFICE

■ The Office of the Association shall be at Raja Peary Mohan College

3. FINANCIAL YEAR

The Financial Year of the Association shall be from 1st of April

to 31st March.

4. OBJECTS

- The objects of the Association shall be:
- to bring together the past students of Raja Peary Mohan College into an Association and to give them a distinct identity of belonging to the College
- to associate the alumni with the Raja Peary Mohan College in whatever possible manner as the Governing Body of the College may deem fit and proper, more particularly in the Academic, Cultural, Sports, Social Service and other related areas of the working of the College, from time to time.
- to associate the alumni with various activities including important programmes such as celebration of foundation day and/or college annual day that may be organized by the college from time to time, as may be decided by the Principal in consultation with the teaching and non teaching staff members in the Principal's Room.
- to associate the alumni with the development of the college including planning of new activities and to assist in raising funds as may be decided by and with the specific and prior permission of the Governing Body of the College.
- to institute Awards, Prizes or provide Assistance, physical and/or monetary, to outstanding students of the college in the degree and junior with the specific and prior permission of the Governing Body of the College, aimed at encouraging academic and/or co-curricular and/or extracurricular achievements.
- to associate in all such other activities of the college as are incidental and ancillary thereto or conducive to the attainment of the above objects, as may be decided by the Association subject to separate permission of the Governing Body of the College.

5. MEMBERSHIP OF THE ASSOCIATION

- There shall be two different types of Members of the Association viz.,
 - (a) Ordinary Members; and
 - (b) Life Members.
- An Ordinary Member shall be one who has been a past student of the College, Junior or Senior, and who has passed at least a degree course from this College or elsewhere, and who has filled the prescribed form and paid the annual fees as prescribed by the Association or being an Ordinary Member. Such member shall be required to renew his membership annually by payment of the prescribed fee and on failure to do so; the membership shall lapse unless restored by completing the formalities for the purpose.
- A Life Member shall be one who has been a past student of the College, Junior or Senior, and who has passed at least a degree course from this College or elsewhere, and who has filled the prescribed form and paid the one time fees as prescribed by the Association for being a Life Member. The membership shall be for life-time and such member shall not be required to renew his membership.
- An Ordinary Member shall become a Life Member on such member making Application for the purpose and depositing the prescribed fees with the Association.

6. REGISTER OF MEMBERS

The Association shall maintain a Register of Members and update the said Register once in three months or as frequently as may be necessary. Updated Computerized List of Members may be kept on record mentioning the necessary particulars including the date of receipt of membership fees and the date of next renewal.

7. MEMBERSHIP FEES

- The Membership fee shall be Rs.100/- (Rupees One Hundred only) per annum for an Ordinary Member and Rs.500/- (Rupees Five Hundred only) for a Life Member.
- Receipts shall be passed by the Association and given to the Members on receipt of payments, in cash or cheque, for membership, mentioning the Status of the Member as Ordinary or Life.

8. MANAGING COMMITTEE

- The affairs of the Association, financial and otherwise, shall be conducted by a Managing Committee of 15 persons consisting of five office Bearers and ten Members. The office Bearers shall be a President; a Vice President; a General Secretary; a Joint Secretary and a Treasurer. The President and the Treasurer shall be form the Life Member only. Two of the Office Bearers and three of the other members shall be women.
- There shall be three ex-officio member of the Managing Committee. viz., the Principal of the College (and in absence of Principal, in-charge Principal if any), and two teachers of the college nominated by the Principal of the college. They shall have all rights as other members and shall guide the Association.
- The term of office of the Managing Committee shall be three years, and the same shall be constituted by election from among the members of the Association. In case of any member of the Managing Committee or office bearer ceasing to be member or office bearer, the vacancy of the new member or office bearer as the case may be, shall be filled in by the Managing Committee which shall be for the remainder of the term of the outgoing member or office bearer. Such arrangement shall continue as stop-gap arrangement shall continue as stop-gap arrangement till the next election.

9. DUTIES OF THE OFFICE BEARERS

The President and the Vice President shall preside over the meeting of the Managing Committee. The General Secretary shall issue all notices, agenda for all the meeting of the Association and maintain Minutes of all the meeting and act as custodian of the records of the records of the Association. The Joint Secretary shall assist the General Secretary in his secretarial and other work. In the absence of the General Secretary, the Joint Secretary shall look after the duties of the General Secretary. The Treasurer shall cause to maintain accounts of the Association and shall place before the Managing Committee and the Annual General Body the duly Audited Statements of Accounts of the Association for approval and adoption. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the proper and regular upkeep of all the account of the Association.

10. MEETING

- There shall be at least three meeting of the Managing Committee annually. There shall be at least one meeting of the General Body annually which shall be called the Annual General Body Meeting. The meeting where triennial elections are held will be called Statutory Meeting. Between any two Annual General Body Meeting, not more that 18 months shall pass. Additional Meeting, if convened, of the Annual General Body, shall be to transact special business may be notified in the Agenda of the meeting, and such meeting shall be called Special Annual General Meeting.
- The meeting of the Association shall ordinarily be held at the college. The quorum for all meetings shall be one-third of the total membership of the body. If there is no quorum at the appointed time for the commencement of the meeting, the General Secretary shall announce that the meeting shall be adjourned by half an hour. The meeting shall then be held after half an hour and the members present shall constitute the quorum.
- One-tenth of the members of the Association may, in writing to the President, call for convening a Requisition Meeting for any urgent

business to be transacted as may be stated in the requisition notice. On receipt of such notice, the President and the General Secretary shall convene the Special Requisition General Body Meeting within 3 days of the receipt of such notice. If they fail to so convene the meeting, the requisitions shall be entitled to hold the said meeting on any day and time at the college or at any other suitable place after the said third day and elect a Chair-person for the said meeting. They shall prepare the Minutes of such meeting recording all decisions which will be signed and certified by the said Chair-person. The decisions shall be binding on the Association if the same are not contrary to the existing constitution and/or rules of the Association.

There shall be a notice of 7 days for all the meeting of the Managing Committee. However, emergency meetings may be convened even with 24 hour notice but to transact only such business as might arise in an emergency. There shall be a notice of 14 clear days for all the meeting of the Annual General Body and the notice shall indicate the business to be transacted at the meeting.

11. BANK ACCOUNT

The Managing Committee shall open Account with a nationalized bank, where the college account is already in operation. The Account shall be jointly operated by the President, the General Secretary and the Treasurer with at least two of them signing to operate the account.

12. ANNUAL AUDIT

 The accounts of the Association shall be audited annually by competent auditors appointed by the Managing Committee.

13. INSPECTION OF BOOKS OF ACCOUNTS & OTHER DOCUMENTS

The books of accounts and other document such as receipts, vouchers, register of members shall be open to inspection by any member or office bearer at...... before the date of Annual General Meeting during the dates and hours as may be fixed by the Managing Committee excluding holidays. In case a requisition, in writing, is made for inspection of specified documents, such inspection shall be granted by fixing a date and time within a week from the receipt of such notice.

14. AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION

The constitution and/or Rules, if any, may be amended, altered, substituted, rescinded or added to at any time by a majority of two-thirds of the members present and voting at a general body meeting, provided previous notice of at least fourteen days of the proposed amendments, is given to the members.

15. DISSOLUTION OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Association shall not be dissolved except by the vote of majority of three fourths members present at the General Body Meeting called specifically for the purpose, provided the total number of votes cast at such a meeting is not less than two-thirds of the total number of members on the roll of the Association.

31. ACTIVITIES AND SUPPORT FROM THE PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

The college is yet to officially form a Parent-Teacher association but every department organizes parent-teacher meetings regularly to discuss the performance of the students and also to exchange ideas regarding the college and students. Constructive criticism is given the utmost priority in these meetings, which later help the students to enhance their performance level.

Parent – Teacher Meeting:

Some Departments (like Bengali, English, Chemistry, Mathematics, Philosophy, Physiology, Zoology and Commerce) have conducted Parent Teacher meetings to interact with parents regarding their wards.

32. HEALTH SERVICES

RAJA PEARY MOHAN COLLEGE MEDICAL UNIT

The Medical Unit under the aegis of the convener, Dr. Sugopa Ghosh Mondal has made great progress in monitoring the health of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff. Most of the students have been issued health cards.

Members of the Alumni Association and one of the donor members of the Governing Body are experienced physicians and they have also volunteered to provide free medical check-up once in a month. This year the unit organized a health camp on physical checkup of I st year students of the college, which included pressure, height weight and general check up of all students and also blood group test. Some of the activities of the unit in the Post NAAC Period are as follows:

 - Dr. Apurba Kumar Dey is given the unique opportunity to direct a play enacted by the sex workers at Kalighat on behalf of the Daywalka Foundation (TDF) which is an NGO that combat all forms of violence against women and children, focusing on modern day slavery and human trafficking.
 - Dr. Sudhin Kr Bera who is also an Chartered Account and provide consultancy services regarding direct and indirect taxes and other financial matters in the college and also out side the college

37. PLACEMENT SERVICES PROVIDED TO STUDENTS

At present there is no organised placement cell in the college but the teachers individually advise the students with respect to various career options.
